
INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

Relation between wage work and subsistence:

- rotational shiftwork in the mining industry and subsistence activities such as hunting, gathering, trapping, fishing and (community) gardening
- practiced by Na-Cho Nyak Dun and Kaska Dena First Nation people in the Yukon Territory, Canada.

Regional background: economic situation in the Yukon Territory characterized by parallel occurrence of mining employment and subsistence activities.


First-Nation Self-Government: Exceptionally high government employment in First Nation government organizations/sections





FIRST NATIONS?

- Supposed that First Nation economies would disappear in favor of an inclusion into the white-dominated wage-earning culture.
- Former nomadic peoples were (sometimes forcefully) resettled among major transportation routes such as the Klondike Highway.
- Focus on: First Nation miners (male/female), their families and community members in general.
- What are peoples experiences being 'hunters and miners'?







